Why Shouldn't Non-profits (specifically 501(c)(3)s) advocate or lobby?





Because the IRS says so...



501(c)(3)s can lobby as long as they:

- Spend within the limits set by the IRS (they are fairly generous)
- Some things which might fall under the category of "lobbying" do not count for the IRS.
 - Communications on an issue that will affect the organization
 - Communications with non-profit members on issues
- DO NOT get involved with Electoral campaigns (this is quite clear throughout the law)



Grass tops vs. Grass roots

"Grass tops" means a CEO, ED or lobbyist is advocating to a Governor, Legislator, or High-level staff person. This is easier and less expensive than grassroots.

Board Members can fit in both categories

"Grass Roots" means getting individual, everyday citizens to contact their legislator or Governor or other elected or appointed policy maker. This is very time intensive and can be expensive. But when done correctly the impact can be massive.



Fundraising Legislation



The Delaware AG's office has decided to pursue legislation that would require every organization and professional fundraiser raising money in the state to register with the AG's office and pay a fee based on their operating budget. Fees range from \$500 to \$10,000. A non-profit nursing home is looking at a fee of \$5,000, what should they do?



Housing Project

A housing nonprofit wants to build a tiny home village in western Kent County. But this will require:

- A Delaware Code Change
- Help from the Delaware Housing Administration
- A variance from the County
- Planning resources and Legal help.
- They have raised \$500,000 specifically for the things above, and their total budget is \$1 Million. They estimate legal and planning fees at \$200,000.

- Bond Bill






Animals and Domestic Violence

If a pet is involved in a domestic violence case, then it is considered (under DE Law) to be evidence. This means that it is held and cared for by the state's designated animal care organization. These cases can take months to be adjudicated by the Family Court. In the meantime, the pet is separated from it's person/people and the animal organization is responsible for the care of that animal.
